SURVEY OF THE GREEN, 11TH JUNE 2011

Kingsland Green was very lively last Saturday morning, with lots of children, as well as the Herefordshire Nature Trust, the Herefordshire Botanical Society and John Davies of the Herefordshire Ornithological Society, who noted 19 species of birds!

The President of the Botanical Society showed us specimens of grasses, and gave a brief, vivid talk on the different sorts of grassland. We take grass for granted, but it is crucial to our environment. Over 63 species of plants were found (see table below) The prizes for the Bird Quiz at Easter were given by David Hugh-Jones to Seb Beebee (1st) and Sophie Price and Ella Strangwood (joint 2nd). Watch out for another bird quiz.

Some brave explorers, ignoring prickles, found a few creepy-crawlies, including the back door of what we thought was a stag horn beetle, but were told by Margaret Barclay of HNT that it was a longhorn. It was a lovely day. We picnicked on the grass, and a whole tinful of biscuits was eaten. John Davies showed us a most beautiful greenfinch in a birch, though it's song is more of a wheeze than anything. These wonderful experts even managed to show us the difference between a creeping thistle and a spear thistle. And we all admired the common spotted orchids, dactylorhiza fuchsia, which we hope will stay with us and multiply. Thank you to everyone!

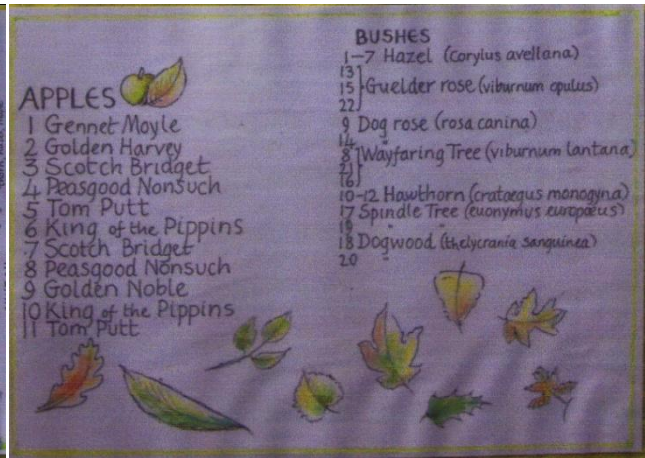
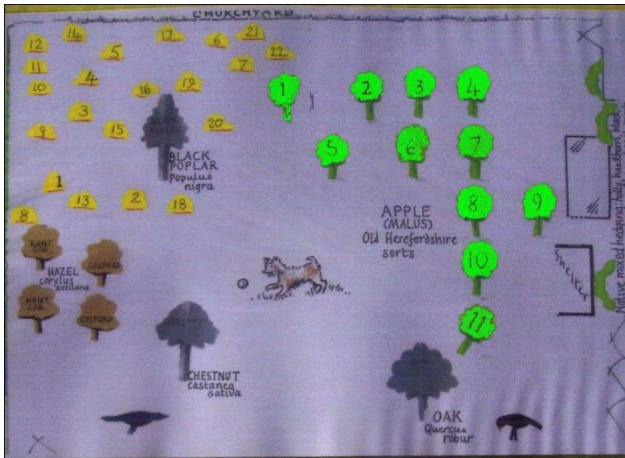
